TEW ENGLAND has become the favorite touring section of America, for nowhere else can there be found such a variety of scenery contained within a comparatively small area, so many miles of good roads, or so many places of historic interest. For generations isolated New England Resorts were famous, but with the coming of the motor-car the entire region has become one vast resort from the rocky cliffs of the Naugatuck Valley to the White Mountains' highest peak.

Aside from natural scenic and historic interest, a large proportion of the population of the newer States came from New England stock and, as expressed by Whittier, this sentimental association adds interest for many people


in a tour of New England.

With the advent of the motor-car to supplement Nev England's natural advantages there arose a demand for the best route through this scenic wonderland, which should in clude the varied scenery of the mountains, with the attendan panorama of stream, lake, forest, rolling farmlands, and the rugged coast of Eastern New England; with the most enjoy able feature of a motor-car trip—A FIRST-CLASS HOTEL AT THE END OF EACH DAY'S RUN.


In 1907, having foreseen the demand for a tour of the New England States, four men fully understanding the needs of the section—Edward P. Ricker, of Poland Spring, Me. C. H. Greenleaf, of Profile House, N. H.; the late Johr Anderson, of Bretton Woods, and Almon C. Judd, of Waterbury, Conn.—determined to issue such a publication.

Taking as a basis the best-known scenic regions, the more important historical points, the larger resorts and the most practical trunk lines, constructed or projected, under the direction of Almon C. Judd, The Ideal Tour was issued first in 1908, meeting with instantaneous success, far beyond ever the anticipations of the originators, who knew the varied attractions of the route, scenic and material, and who realized that the appreciation of the motoring public must follow when descriptive and accurate route directions were presented to them in concise form.

The Automobile Club of America approves of, and cooperates in promoting the idea, as from its inception in 1908, when an official club run was made over The Ideal Tour,

in which many prominent members participated, and the assistance of this Club helped in no small degree to establish the tour in the reputation which it maintains.

The routes are compiled by The Automobile Blue Book Publishing Company, for the benefit of whose valuable experience we are indebted. We also wish to acknowledge the interest shown by the Touring Bureau of the American Automobile Association, and the recommendation of The Ideal Tour by the touring departments of the many automobile clubs of the United States and Canada, whose officers and members have endorsed The Ideal Tour.

How well The Ideal Tour covers New England is evidenced by the fact that a person touring New England, visiting all of the more important points without reference to The Ideal Tour, would find that he had inadvertently covered over half of the tour as laid out.

The Ideal Tour is the Great Interstate Highway of New England,


Those en route for sections of New England not directly on the tour will almost invariably find it advantageous to follow it to the place nearest their objective point, embracing as the route does the natural and best route to the Berkshires, White Mountains, Vermont and Maine.

The book of 1920, is, of course, essentially The Ideal Tour unchanged. Of all the numberless routes that may be chosen in a tour of New England, this trip incorporates a trip of a thousand miles, so arranged that the motorist enjoys the best New England has to offer in scenery; travels over the best New England roads; and stops at the best of New England hotels.

Minor changes have been made in some instances in places where a choice of routes might be had. A representative each year goes over the route and selects the better road, never liverging more than a few miles from the original running lirections, a few changes being made necessary by the constant improvement in roads of this section.

Autumn Touring

The autumn makes an especial appeal to many tourists, and in constantly increasing numbers. In September and October and the gorgeous foliage of the hills and mountains, in their garb as of red and golden brown, mingling here and there the darker as hues of the evergreen, is a never-to-be-forgotten picture, while the crisp, cool days of fall with their bracing air but add zest to the joy of motoring amid such an unrivalled setting. The evening lends an added charm, as one forsakes the broad piazza for the cheerful warmth of the open fire to discuss the incidents of the day's journey.


Touring in the fall has greatly increased within the past few years, so much has the motorist grown to appreciate the pleasures of an automobile tour amid the bracing autumn air of New England.

For the season of 1920 several of the largest hotels will remain open very late in the fall to accommodate this patronage.

The Elton, Waterbury, is open all the year. The Equinox House, Manchaster, Vt., closes November 1st. In the White Mountains, The Profile House is open until September 25th The Crawford House is open until October 7th. Poland Spring House will remain open until October 15th. The Mansion House is open all the year. At New Castle, Hotel Wentworth closes late in September, but accommodations may be had at Portsmouth. In Boston, The Vendome is open all the year, and Copley-Plaza as well. Briarcliff Lodge is open until December 1. The Biltmore, New York, is open all the year.

The Ideal Tour Reversed

In response to the demand from the motoring public we added "The Ideal Tour Reversed," giving the running directions in the opposite direction from that in which the tour is usually made.

The Ideal Tour Route through New England has become a great interstate highway which motorists en route for all New England resorts, The White Mountains, Maine, The Berkshires or other points almost invariably follow to the point nearest their destination, as The Ideal Tour combines the most beautiful scenic effects, the best roads, and conveniently situated hotels of the highest class, and it is sometimes more convenient for these motorists to reverse the tour, or join it at some point en route.

Also, there are many people who, having taken The Ideal Tour once or several times in the usual way, find that by reversing the route they enjoy practically a new tour; by going in a different direction the tourist has an entirely new conception of the scenery. One may, therefore, vary this route without losing the advantages enjoyed by The Ideal Tour, in hotels, roads and scenery, obtainable nowhere else in this country.

To those taking The Ideal Tour for the first time, we strongly recommend The Ideal Tour as originally planned as the best effect of the apex of the tour "The White Mountains" may be obtained in no way as well as approaching them from Franconia Notch.

First Day

The first day's run to Waterbury, Conn., forms a part of the famous "Scenic Naugatuck Valley Route, the Gateway to the Berkshires and all New England." To the Berkshires it is but ten miles longer than the shortest way, has preeminently the best roads and is by far the most picturesque route of western New England. To Boston the distance is but six miles greater than by way of The Post Road, and beyond comparison in scenic beauty.

Upon leaving New York at once the tourist enters upon

Upon leaving New York at once the tourist enters upon scenes of historic interest and scenic beauty. Following the famous old Boston Post Road, started in 1669, and gradually added to until it became the main artery into New England. This highway bordering Long Island Sound passes through many towns of colonial settlement. At Rye the present Town Hall was formerly "Haviland Tavern" commended by no less a tourist than George Washington in his diary as "A neat and decent inn."

Greenwich is the first New England town entered and has its share of Revolutionary history and landmarks, principally centered about the raid made by Governor Tyson, and the escape of General Putnam, including the steps which General Putnam did not ride down at a gallop to escape the British.

Norwalk and Southport are also rich in local history.


Southport being the scene of "The Great Swamp Fight" which ended the "Pequot War" in 1637, as indicated by a monument recently erected.

Stratford marks the end of the line of closely located early settlements. It escaped the ravages of the British during the Revolution and consequently contains many of its original old colonial houses.

At Stratford the tourist leaves the Sound and turns north, following the left bank of the Housatonic towards the Berkshire Hills.

At Shelton one enters the beautiful Naugatuck Valley,

whose scenic attractions are unsurpassed on the entire tour, and as one follows the winding river over the splendid route which lies between green hills and towering rocky cliffs one is satisfied that he is indeed fairly embarked on The Ideal Tour

The Naugatuck Valley since the days of the Indian trails along the banks of the Naugatuck River has been used as the highway from the Sound to the Berkshire Hills, wending its way north through towering cliffs and forests, following the Naugatuck River over the splendid roads which had their inception long before Washington and his Continentals marched through the picturesque valley. At Naugatuck may be still seen "The Porter House," marked with a suitable tablet, where the Great American made his headquarters.

The Naugatuck Valley is dotted here and there with busy towns—whose factories make most of the brass used in the world—yet for many miles at a time one passes through almost primeval forests amid the great rocks rising sheer to heights of 300 feet or more. The very nature of these portions of the valley prohibits the despoliation of man, and so lends the valley in all of its wild and rugged beauty to the lover of nature and the motor-car. The Naugatuck Valley Boulevard was opened for 1919 touring travel. It is the widest cement road ever constructed in the State. Situated in the heart of this valley is the city of Waterbury, famous for its brass foundries and its splendid hotel.

WATERBURY, CONN.

is the end of the first day's run and here is located THE ELTON, a magnificent fireproof hotel, delightfully situated on "The Green" and surrounded by beautiful private estates, open all the year. Guests may have the courtesies of the Country Club of Waterbury, including the golf links, extended to them upon application at the hotel office.

The Elton is conducted upon the European plan and the grillroom is one of the most prominent features. The cuisine

is of an excellence that has called forth many compliments from the most critical. Opening in 1905, The Elton is still called by its patrons "The Most Attractive Hotel in New England." It was the first hotel built in one of the smaller cities on the elaborate scale of the best hotels of the metropolitan centers, and its success is evidenced by the many fine

houses since erected in cities of like size.

Waterbury is a rare combination of city beautiful and manufacturing town. It was founded in 1664 by a committee from Farmington, who purchased a tract ten miles wide and eighteen miles long from the Indians for £9. The settlement was formed on the bank of the Naugatuck River and called Mattatuck. In estimating the extent of their purchase the committee decided that the tract would comfortably accom-modate thirty families. As to-day the population of Waterbury is 95,000 and a dozen odd towns are situated on their purchase, bringing the population to near 150,000, it is certain that they did not overestimate. King Philip's War retarded the growth of the town and for years afterwards the in-habitants lived in daily fear of the Indians. In 1708 the Colony voted £15 for the construction of two forts, the town building a third. Waterbury was sufficiently distant from the coast to escape attacks by the British during the Revolution. Rochambeau and his French army were encamped for many months awaiting the passing of winter just outside of the city limits, and a monument marks the spot.

Waterbury is the principal stopping-place for those who are entering or leaving New England, and as such the manage-ment of The Elton maintains a complete Ideal Tour Route Information Bureau for the convenience of tourists. All latest information of New England, as well as New York

and New Jersey, routes may be obtained.

The Elton is on The Ideal Tour, The Empire Tour, Post Road and Green Mountain Tours of The Automobile Club of America and New England Tours of the Hotel Associa-tion. The Air Line Route between New York and Boston is a pleasing variant. Route cards may be obtained at The Elton.




Manchester, Main Street and Equinox House

Second Day

One of the few changes which have been made in The Ideal Tour since 1908 is the lengthening of the second day's run direct to Manchester, Vt., due to the wonderful improvement of the roads in the Naugatuck Valley and beyond through Massachusetts and Vermont, which has so shortened the running time that it takes but a matter of three or four hours for the motorist to reach Pittsfield, more than half way to Manchester, which, of course, is not satisfying to the tourist who wishes to occupy a full day touring. Like Waterbury, Manchester is an important geographical center for the motorist, and the first demand and consideration after hotel accommodations are assured, is that the length of the day's run be suited to the character of the roads. The change in the length of the day's run met with instant approval from those en route over The Ideal Tour, the second day's run being 134 miles over splendid roads, through magnificent scenery, and is one of the most popular on the tour. There are several splendid hotels in the Berkshires, and those who wish to tarry will find ample accommodations.

The start of the second day's run is a continuation of the famous Naugatuck Valley Route. One finds most beautiful scenery just above Waterbury through Thomaston, famous for its clock works, and through the rolling Berkshire foothills, fairly among the Berkshires at Norfolk, passing through Canaan, Great Barrington, Stockbridge and Lenox to Pittsfield.

The Berkshires are famous as the summer homes of many literary men; among them, Jonathan Edwards, who was pastor of the Indian Mission Church, and left there to take up his duties as President of Princeton College; others who have spent their summers here and written many of their

famous works amid those beautiful hills were William Cullen Bryant, Oliver Wendell Holmes, Longfellow and Hawthorne. The attractiveness of the Berkshire Hills is well known. Mountain scenery of great beauty; lakes set like sapphires amid the hills; the sparkling Housatonic River winding in and out through forest and field, all combine to make this one of the most interesting days of the tour.

Entering Vermont, Old Bennington irresistibly attracts the historically inclined. Bennington was the scene of many bitter conflicts previous to the Revolution between the province of New York, which wished to claim that section, and the stalwart Green Mountain Men who asserted their preparedness in no uncertain terms.

The climax came when the Vermonters slew a catamount and hung the body on the door of an inn frequented by their opponents, as an ultimatum of what would follow should the New Yorkers persist in their endeavors to claim their State. The site of this inn is marked by a monument of a catamount facing the State of New York. Just north of this is the monument of the Battle of Bennington. The Walloomsac Inn, itself over one hundred and fifty years old, is recommended as a luncheon stop.


At Manchester the tourist will find the Equinox House, one of the oldest resort hotels in the country, but modernized and up to date in every way, situated at the foot of Mt. Equinox. Here is the Ekwanok Country Club, whose golf links are acknowledged by good golfers to be one of the finest courses in the country.

Many important golf tournaments are held during the season and the "Center of summer golf" has become synonymous with the word "Ekwanok." During the season of 1914 the Amateur Golf Championship of the United States was held here, which still further added to the golfing prestige of the resort.

Manchester is a quaint and attractive village. Practically inchanged since the days of the Revolution. As one promenades the famous marble walks in the cool of the evening, the modern motor-car running silently along seems out of place, and one almost expects instead to hear the tread of martial feet and to see Ethan Allen at the head of his Green Mountain Boys go marching past. For motoring, Manchester is fortunate in its location near the Peru Pass, the most practical entrance to the White Mountains, and in consequence Equinox House enjoys a large motoring patronage. The Battenkill, a famous trout stream, runs through the village.

A new garage and chauffeurs' hotel are now conducted by the Equinox Company.



Third Day

On the third day, after crossing the Connecticut River at Springfield, Vt., New Hampshire is reached. Peru Mountain pass, much improved as to grade, is negotiated soon after leaving Manchester. Between the prosperous and pleasing villages lies, perhaps, the most primitive section of the entire tour, and one feels the old New England atmosphere of granite hills and stony farms which have sent many famous men into the world's affairs.

At Newbury is the country estate of the late John Hay, Secretary of State. The New Hampshire lake region is of unusual beauty and great improvements are being made each year in the roads of this section.




Ascending the Notch and just before reaching the Profile House, a glimpse may be had of the "Old Man of the Mountains," one of the natural wonders of the world.

Profile Lake and Eagle Cliff at Profile House



The seventh stage is through Portland, where the coast is reached. Portland is a most beautiful city—the birthplace of Longfellow—where numerous points of interest abound, Following the rugged coast through Wells, Kennebunk and York Beach, well known for their beautiful summer residences, to Kittery, the last town in Maine, one crosses the Piscataqua River to Portsmouth, famous for its Navy Yard and as the scene of the Russian-Japanese Peace Conference in 1905. Portsmouth has many beautiful old houses of the period of the Revolution.

Most of the new State road between Portland and Portsmouth is now completed. In the construction about twelve miles of cement road has been laid and the balance that has been completed is fine gravel State road.


The towns on this highway have realized the importance of good roads and are doing everything in their power to make this the best trunk line in the State of Maine.
